L.A. Department of Health Services Proposes Reduced Reimbursement Rate for PSIP

The Department of Health Services (DHS) has informed the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors that, due to the FY 2009-2010 state budget funding reductions to the Physician Services for Indigents Program (PSIP), the continued increase in claim volume, and a slight increase in payment per claim, DHS is proposing a reduction in the PSIP reimbursement rate from 18 percent to 12 percent for all outstand-

ing claims FY 2010-2011, and a reduction in the rate for FY 2011-2012 to 14 percent of the Official County Fee Schedule. DHS has stopped payment of FY 2010-2011 claims and will resume payment when the Board approves the reduced rate.

PSIP has historically been funded by a combination of EMS/Maddy Funds, Los Angeles County Measure B property assessment funds and EMSA funds.

This reduced reimbursement rate could result in PSIP ER reimbursement rates falling below 50 percent of Medi-Cal payments, which will exacerbate an already challenging situation by limiting the availability of physicians willing to be oncall to a private ER.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors will take action on this matter in the coming weeks.

HASC Opposes Proposed Solid Waste Franchise for Los Angeles Hospitals

The comment period for the issue of Solid Resources Citywide Recycling for Los Angeles has been extended to Friday, Oct. 7.

HASC believes the current exclusive franchise proposal plan is silent on the unique service and need of hospitals as it relates to the handling of regulated medical waste and pharmaceutical disposal. The creation of waste sheds will impair a hospital's ability to contract with a specialized waste hauler, which the California Department of Public Health regulates. Health and Safety Code Section 118000, under the Medical Waste Management Act, outlines

the manner in which such waste shall be transported, as well as addresses the requirement that such waste be separated from other types of waste.

A hospital may also contract with multiple companies to handle its various waste streams. Factors taken into consideration include pricing, experience, environmental goals and regulatory compliance. Under the exclusive waste shed franchise proposal, the option and ability for a hospital to select and negotiate with a particular waste hauler would be eliminated.

For these reasons, HASC encourages the Bureau of

Sanitation to exempt hospitals from the exclusive waste shed concept based on the regulatory requirements they must adhere to. An attempt to incorporate hospitals into a waste shed proposal can place a local ordinance in conflict with state and federal requirements as outlined in the Medical Waste Management Act.

November CalFresh Orientations Will Focus on Connecting Medi-Cal Patients with Food Programs

HASC and the Los Angeles County of Department Social Services will host a community outreach orientation for Los Angeles County HASC hospitals focusing on connecting Medi-Cal patients with access to the benefits of CalFresh, the new name for California's Food Stamp Program (also known on the Federal level as Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program or SNAP).

CalFresh provides assistance for low income individuals and families to purchase nutritious foods. A cost-benefit analysis examining 10

common nutritional-related diseases/conditions such as colorectal cancer, heart disease, stroke hypertension, Type 2 diabetes and obesity, indicated that every \$1.00 invested in an a nutrition access program produces \$10.64 in benefits from reduced health care cost, according to a 2009 Year-End Report from the North Carolina **Expanded Food and Nutrition** Education Program.

The orientations are scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 9, 9:00 -10:30 a.m. or Tuesday, Nov. 15, 1:00 - 2:30 p.m. The orientations will take place at Beverly Gain Region, 2910 W. Beverly Blvd., Los Angeles. Sessions are geared toward hospital staff in the following areas: admitting, business office, patient financial services, social work, case management/discharge planning, human resources, and dietitians/nutritionists.

Hospitals Are Encouraged to Sign Up for Partnership for Patients Initiative

CHA and HASC's Public Advocacy Program is launching a statewide patient safety campaign that will showcase efforts by California community hospitals to reduce hospital-acquired infections and other preventable conditions like pressure ulcers and patient falls. Palliative Care Committee Renamed Care Transitions

At its most recent meeting, the **HASC** Palliative Care Committee officially changed its name to the Care Transitions Committee. The change better reflects the efficiencies gained through patient care integration across the post-acute care continuum. The committee will continue to encourage the growth of hospital-based palliative care programs and represent palliative care professionals in the HASC membership.

The Palliative Care/Care Transitions Committee serves as a network for health care professionals to exchange information and help create and strengthen existing palliative care programs. Members

now include physicians, nurses, social workers, chaplains, nurse practitioners, hospice and other post-acute care providers. The group's goal is to establish palliative care programs in 50 percent of Southern California's acute-care hospitals. The next committee meeting is scheduled for Dec. 1 at the HASC Los Angeles Office.

Also at the most recent meeting, guest presenters from the Joyce Eisenberg Keefer Medical Center--Molly Forrest, president/CEO; Arnold Possick, vice president, Community-Based Services; and Dr. Esiquio Casillas, associate medical director & Home/Community-Based Services-demonstrated a comprehensive service model addressing care transitions, short-term rehabilitation, psychiatric care, palliative care, hospice and community-based care for seniors.
