# Flu Season Meeting in Inland Area Brings Together Regional Experts

HASC coordinated a regional meeting on Nov. 1 to share information with Inland region hospitals regarding the flu season, which runs from November through March. The meeting, which was held at Riverside Community Hospital, had approximately 40 attendees.

Patrick Brilliant, CEO of Riverside Community Hospital, offered opening remarks for the flu meeting. Speakers represented Riverside County Public Health, San Bernardino County Public Health, Riverside County EMS, ICEMA and the California Department of Public Health. Topics ranged from looking at the flu vaccine at both a national and local level, what public health is doing to protect the health of the population to prevent a flu outbreak, emergency preparedness and response to deal with a surge of those in need of health services, and how to communicate with the local California Department of Public Health office regarding requests for temporary increases to patient accommodations. Dimitrios Alexiou, HASC Vice President. Inland Region, provided closing remarks.

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# New CEO Coming to CalOptima

Michael Schrader, who currently serves as chief operating officer for Boston Medical Center HealthNet Plan (BMC HealthNet), will join CalOptima in January as its new CEO. In accepting this position, Schrader will be returning to California, where he previously served as COO at CenCal Health, the County Organized Health System (COHS) serving Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties. In making the CalOptima announcement on Nov. 1, CalOptima Board Chair Mark Refowitz said, "The Board was committed to bringing in the right person for this important role. There were many qualified candidates . . . we are confident he will be a great leader for our staff and to our stakeholders."

The CalOptima Board also recently announced the appointment of Michael Ewing, former Interim CFO, as permanent CFO. Under the steady leadership of a strong board and an interim COO, the agency continues to make solid progress toward implementing new programs and working toward health care reform, without interruption to the provision of care for its members, notwithstanding these management team recruitments.

# Last Chance to Attend LEAD Academy® in 2012

The last two LEAD Academy sessions in 2012 are scheduled for Nov. 16 and Dec. 7. LEAD Academy is an intensive six-day, 12-module training experience using innovative tools and experiential learning to empower recently hired, newly appointed or previously untrained health care managers and supervisors to better understand and use their strengths, and to overcome the distinct challenges of being a leader.

Each session includes two modules taught in small groups to maximize the interactions and networking opportunities, and to help create a safe environment for practicing newly learned skills. Engage with colleagues and expert instructors in organizational dynamics, Lean thinking and behavioral change.

Nov. 16 (session 5) covers Resolving Interpersonal Conflict, and Organizing Your Time, Work and Priorities. Attendees will learn to identify common sources of conflict, options for responding to conflict, and how to have conversations for productive conflict resolution.

The second module, *Organizing Your Time, Work and Priorities*, will include instruction on overcoming procrastination and indecision, how to prioritize, developing a personal productivity strategy,

organizing your workspace, and balancing emotional energy with objectivity.

The Dec. 7 session includes the modules Why and How of Organizational Policies, and Business and Finance for Today's Health Care Leader covering organizational behavior, developing policies and procedures, organizational performance measures, health care reimbursement, and budget creation.

### RAMP Streamlines the Reimbursement Process

Rapid Applications for Medical Programs (RAMP) is a customized web-based tool used to screen for financial assistance programs like Medi-Cal, CMSP, Crime Victim Compensation, Section 1011 and hospital assistance/charity.

First introduced to HASC members last year, RAMP is already providing a significant return. Centinela Hospital Medical Center began RAMP implementation March 15, 2012. Within 60 days, the hospital screened 170 patients.

R&B Solutions, the developer of the software, recently upgraded the program to include screening questions related to date of entry for non-citizen household members, COBRA eligibility and COBRA monthly costs. RAMP can also include financial information about significant others/domestic partners.

An easy-to-use application, RAMP streamlines many administrative processes. Based on the client interview, RAMP auto-populates certain fields of relevant application forms and allows attachments like medical releases and charity documents. The system even facilitates income estimation, address verifications and the gathering of other financial information for quicker, more accurate applications.
