This one-day event focuses on how hospitals and health systems can identify human-trafficked victims in their hospitals and how to respond to the situation. Participants will walk away understanding what human trafficking means, what common red flags are seen in the health care setting, and how to respond using a victim-centered, trauma-informed approach. The program includes an interactive lecture, a survivor story, a review of evidence-based victim response procedures and a group discussion using case scenarios.

Course Objectives

At the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- Describe the problem and misconceptions associated with human trafficking.
- Understand how hospitals can recognize human-trafficked victims and react by using a victim-centered, trauma-informed response.
- Identify how to use community resources and other effective responses to human trafficking.

Holly Austin Gibbs Human Trafficking Response Program Director Dignity Health Patient Care Services

Holly Austin Gibbs is director of the Human Trafficking Response Program at Dignity Health, one of the largest hospital providers in California. She joined Dignity Health in 2015 and oversees efforts to recognize and respond to trafficked persons in the health care setting. In 2014, Gibbs published an academic book titled, *Walking Prey: How America's Youth are Vulnerable to Sex Slavery*,

and she is a current blogger for the Huffington Post. Gibbs has a bachelor's degree in biology and formerly worked as a senior microscope technician and training supervisor for a national environmental microbiology laboratory. As a survivor of child sex trafficking, Gibbs has testified before Congress and consulted for numerous organizations, including the U.S. Office for Victims of Crime, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children, and the Department of Health & Human Services.



Carolyn Liu Lumpkin, LCSW Director of Empowerment Programs Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking

Carolyn Liu Lumpkin is director of empowerment programs at the Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST), overseeing social services programs and survivor leadership programs. In 2004, she served with CAST as a case manager and a shelter night manager. Prior to returning to CAST in 2016, Lumpkin was clinical program manager for the Wraparound Program with Children's

Institute, Inc. in South Los Angeles. She has extensive experience providing trauma-informed mental health services in communities with high rates of poverty, crime and violence. In addition, Lumpkin implemented an integrated treatment model for adolescents with substance abuse and trauma histories in the South Los Angeles area, and has utilized multiple evidence-based treatment practices in her clinical work. Lumpkin is also a trainer for programs that address vicarious trauma and compassion fatigue. She earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from UC Berkeley and her master's in social work from Cal State Long Beach. Lumpkin is a California Licensed Clinical Social Worker.
