Speaker Biographies

Betty Ferrell, RN, PhD, MA, FAAN, FPCN, CHPN, - an oncology nurse for 33 years has focused her clinical expertise and research in pain management, quality of life and palliative care. Dr. Ferrell is a Professor and Research Scientist at the City of Hope Medical Center in Los Angeles. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, and she has more than 300 publications in peer-reviewed journals and texts. She is Principal Investigator of a Program Project funded by the National Cancer Institute on "Palliative Care for Quality of Life and Symptom Concerns in Lung Cancer" and Principal Investigator of the "End-of-Life Nursing Education Consortium (ELNEC)" project. She directs several other funded projects related to palliative care in cancer centers and QOL issues. Dr. Ferrell is a member of the National Cancer Policy Forum and was Chairperson of the National Consensus Project for Quality Palliative Care. She served on the National Quality Forum Committee for Preferred Practices in palliative care. She has authored eight books including the Oxford Textbook of Palliative Nursing Care (2010) (3rd edition). She is co-author of the text, The Nature of Suffering and the Goals of Nursing published in 2008 by Oxford University Press and Making Health Care Whole: Integrating Spirituality into Patient Care (Templeton Press, 2010). Dr. Ferrell completed a master's degree in theology, ethics and culture from Claremont Graduate University in 2007. In 2010, Dr. Ferrell was appointed to the Board of Scientific Advisors of the National Cancer Institute.

Michael W. Rabow, M.D., is a Professor of Clinical Medicine in the Division of General Internal Medicine, Department of Medicine, at the University of California, San Francisco. Board-certified in internal medicine and hospice and palliative care, Dr. Rabow directs a leading outpatient palliative care consultation program — the Symptom Management Service — at the UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center. He is the Associate Director of the UCSF Palliative Care Leadership Center (PCLC). Dr. Rabow was Assistant Editor for the recently completed bimonthly section in the Journal of the American Medical Association entitled "Perspectives on Care at the Close of Life." The papers from this section have recently been updated and compiled into a book, Care at the Close of Life. Dr. Rabow also co-edits the major medical textbook, Current Medical Diagnosis and *Treatment*. Dr. Rabow's research explores the benefits of outpatient palliative care as well as training experiences and professional development in end-of-life care. Dr. Rabow serves as the Director of the Center for the Study of the Healer's Art at the Institute for the Study of Health and Illness at Commonwealth in California. Dr. Rabow has a particular interest in professionalism, professional development and meaning in the doctor-patient relationship.

Speaker Biographies

Simon Wein, M.B.B.S., F.R.A.C.P. graduated from Medical School University of Melbourne in Australia and trained in Internal Medicine and Medical Oncology. He then did a two-year fellowship in psycho-oncology at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center before moving to Israel where he trained for three years in palliative medicine. Dr. Wein returned to Australia to the Peter MacCallum Cancer Center where he took up a full-time senior specialist position as a palliative medicine physician, and as a Senior Lecturer with the University of Melbourne. Then three years ago he was invited to open the Pain and Palliative Care Service at the Davidoff Cancer Center in Petach Tikvah in Israel where he is now situated. He is co-editor of the *Palliative & Supportive Care Journal* and has an abiding interest in psycho-oncology in particular the nature of hope.

Rebecca Gagne Henderson, M.S.N., N.P.-C, A.C.H.P.N. graduated from the University of Southern California in 1994 with her Bachelor of Science in Nursing, and graduated with her Master of Science in Nursing from the Family Nurse Practitioner Program at Azusa Pacific University in 2009. She is an Advanced Practice Certified Hospice and Palliative Nurse (ACHPN) and a Certified Family Nurse Practitioner (NP-C). She has completed the Harvard Medical School Education and Clinical Program. She is currently employed by Long Beach Memorial Medical Center (LBM) to head and develop their Palliative Services Program. She serves on the Long Beach Memorial and White Memorial Hospitals Medical Bioethics Committees. Rebecca's entire nursing career has been spent caring for HIV/AIDS palliative and hospice patients. She has lectured at Fuller Theological Seminary, USC/Doheny Eye Institute, White Memorial Medical Center and for the Hospice and Palliative Nurses Association. She has lectured for grand rounds at Charles R. Drew University of Health Sciences and family physician residents of Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital and Long Beach Memorial. She has taught Community Health Nursing, and Leadership in Nursing at Mt. St. Mary's College in Los Angeles, and Community Health Nursing at Azusa Pacific University and California State University Los Angeles. Rebecca has just been accepted to the Ph.D. in Palliative Care program at the University of Lancaster in the United Kingdom beginning June 2011.
